Why do we have Class Reps?

The Class Rep system is the main way the College finds out about the student experience; the feedback is gathered and presented to College Committees and the Board of Management to help improve your overall experience of College life.

With your help we can collect this information on how you feel about your overall student experience.

We look for two people per class every year to represent the views of the whole class and they feed that information back to us. A Class Rep is a vital link between you, the students, College management and us at the Students' Association.

Class Reps will be trained so that you understand what the role requires, as well as the specific skills and tasks which make you a Rep. Another part of the role is engaging with the staff within your



How it works

Teams Channel

To keep up to date with the latest news, you'll be added to our Class Rep Teams Channel. This is where you can talk about issues with other Reps. If you have a question about Learning & Teaching or you want to see if a problem you are facing is happening across the College, feel free to post about it.

Meetings

Class Rep Meetings led by EC Students' Association happen 3–4 times a year on campus and online. This is your opportunity to feedback any Learning & Teaching issues or successes. They take place at lunchtime. You will also be asked to attend meetings with your department directly – sometimes called Course Meetings.

Surveys

From time to time, we'll ask you to fill out surveys on specific issues, and send them to your classmates to complete too.

Talk to your class

It's important that you know what your class thinks about your course, so we suggest setting up an online group where you can discuss any issues that come up. This also makes it easy for you to ask them questions relating to your duties as Class Rep.

Duties & Responsibilities



- ✓ Talk to your class and LDT about Learning & Teaching issues
- ✓ Attend Class Rep Meetings
- ✓ Present your classmates' opinions on Learning & Teaching issues
- ✓ Network with other Class Reps from across the College
- ✓ Provide feedback on issues to staff and students
- ✓ Develop solutions to issues your class may be experiencing
- ✓ Signpost to EC Students' Association and College departments
- ✓ Read & share any EC Students' Association news shared with you

What NOT to do

Don't get involved with individual student issues

Your role is to represent the collective view of the class. Signpost individual students to other staff or services.

Don't deal with allegations of bullying or harassment

Students who say they are being bullied or harassed should be encouraged to speak with their LDT, lecturer, Student Services or with EC Students' Association directly.

Don't deal with formal complaints

Students wishing to make formal complaints should speak to EC Students' Association or the College's Complaints Coordinator.

Don't punish the actions and behaviour of your classmates


The College and staff will deal with disciplinary issues through their disciplinary process and procedures.

What do Class Reps discuss?


Class Rep discussions focus on the Student Learning Experience, which is made up of all the different segments of the wheel below. We'll go into this in more detail at your training sessions.



The Feedback Loop

Feedback is a vital part of being a Class Rep. You'll be asked to give feedback to a variety of people during your time as a Class Rep, whether it's to your class, teaching staff, EC Students' Association, NUS or any external agencies that want to know what you think of your Student Learning Experience.

We recommend that you ask for 5 minutes of time in your first class after a Class Rep Meeting to tell them what was discussed. Even if there are no formal updates to an issue yet, it's good to keep everyone informed of what's happening at College.



Communicate

If your Class hasn't already done so, you may want to set up an online group for you to keep in contact, e.g. on MS Teams. This provides an easy and accessible way for classmates to communicate any issues they are facing. It also gives space to gather feedback and opinions.

Signpost

Be aware of all the resources and services the College and EC Students' Assciation can offer. There's also a useful list in the back of this handbook.

Teamwork

In in most classes, two reps are elected, so you will have someone to share the work and responsibility with.

Class Rep Strategies

Ask

As what issues your classmates are experiencing as part of their Learning & Teaching experience.
The feedback will be gathered and submitted to us at and discussed at Class Rep Meetings.

Update your Class

As part of your role, you also need to update your classmates about issues that have been resolved or that the Full Time Officers are campaigning for. It is vital this information is passed on so the students see that the student voice is a power tool at Edinburgh College.

Signposting

Signposting means that you direct your classmate to the best department or qualified person to resolve their issues.

The first person you should speak to if you have a learning and teaching issue is your Learning Development Tutor (LDT) or your Course Tutor.

If the issue cannot be resolved at this level you should then contact to your Curriculum Leader or EC Students' Association.
